In Jamaica, the month of March begins with National Peace Day. This year's theme was *"A Better Jamaica – Peace by Peace"* and the Jamaican newspapers featured children in inner city communities coming together to express their hope for peace. Yet, just a few days later, the same newspapers headlined that 15 children had been murdered in just the first few months of the year.

Dr. Kim Scott is part of the Child Resiliency Project in Jamaica, and she wrote about an effective model for supporting children in Jamaica that focuses on the partnership of church, school, family and community over a long development process that *"gives our children a chance to thrive versus just survive."* This is the approach that JSH has always supported with our partners in Jamaica. And clearly it's an approach that is needed now more than ever.

One of JSH's partners, St. Anne's Primary School, is located in a Kingston neighbourhood that has suffered from ongoing tension and violence. While the school itself is a safe zone for children and teachers, the school community has been touched by the violence in the surrounding neighbourhoods. When the situation is particularly difficult, parents are afraid to send their children to school. Last year, two students were caught up in a shooting directly – one was injured and one was killed. This situation has taken its toll on the staff and students at the school, as it has for the broader community. Yet it was in this same neighbourhood that children came together on National Peace Day in a rally to express their hope for peace.

JSH has supported a dance programme at St. Anne's for a number of years, and this year has added a music programme at the school. The principal, Mrs. Forrester, requested this programme as part of her ongoing efforts to address the underlying emotional challenges that the children face, while hoping to build the children's academic success.

In early March Mrs. Forrester wrote to JSH, *"So far, this program has taught me the importance and value of the types of music our children are exposed to, as children learn through music very quickly. It is therefore important that this program continues for our students as it enhances their creativity and can aid in their academic performance."*

"I have also learnt that, as with any adult, through music our children relieve stresses and levels of depression that they may be facing."

Through dance and music the school reaches out to the broader community and invites everyone to come together. This is just one way that St. Anne's Primary School is doing its part to help children to thrive, and create a better Jamaica.

The eagerly anticipated Jamaican' Me Shine Cocktail and Auction fundraiser for Jamaican Self-Help is scheduled to return next month for its 26th year! It will take place on **Saturday April 18th, 2015** from **3:30pm-6:30pm** at Princess Gardens, located at 100 Charlotte Street in Peterborough. This is Jamaican Self-Help's biggest fundraiser of the year, with a fundraising target of \$18,000 to be raised in just under 3 hours! Tickets must be purchased in advance and sell quickly!

There will be exciting live and silent auction items to bid on throughout the afternoon including VIA Rail tickets to Quebec City, a Jamaican Dinner for four, an iPad Mini, gift certificates to local restaurants and over 100 other items! There will also be live entertainment, Caribbean Rum Punch and gourmet hors d'oeuvres served by Hobart's Steakhouse, BE Catering and Brio Gusto. The proceeds from this event support education and youth programs in Jamaica and global education programs in Canada.

Cathie Morrissey, Chair of the Jamaican' Me Shine Committee says, "the organization is commemorating its 35th Anniversary this year and to celebrate, we are bringing new additions to the event including partnering with two local restaurants. This year's event is going to be extra special and we are all really excited!"

The organization has teamed up with Brio Gusto and Hobart's Steakhouse and is encouraging members of the community to continue their support after the auction. The restaurants are donating 10% of Jamaican Self-Help patrons' bills between 6pm-9pm on April 18th to the organization.
